Landlords are not willing to rent their properties

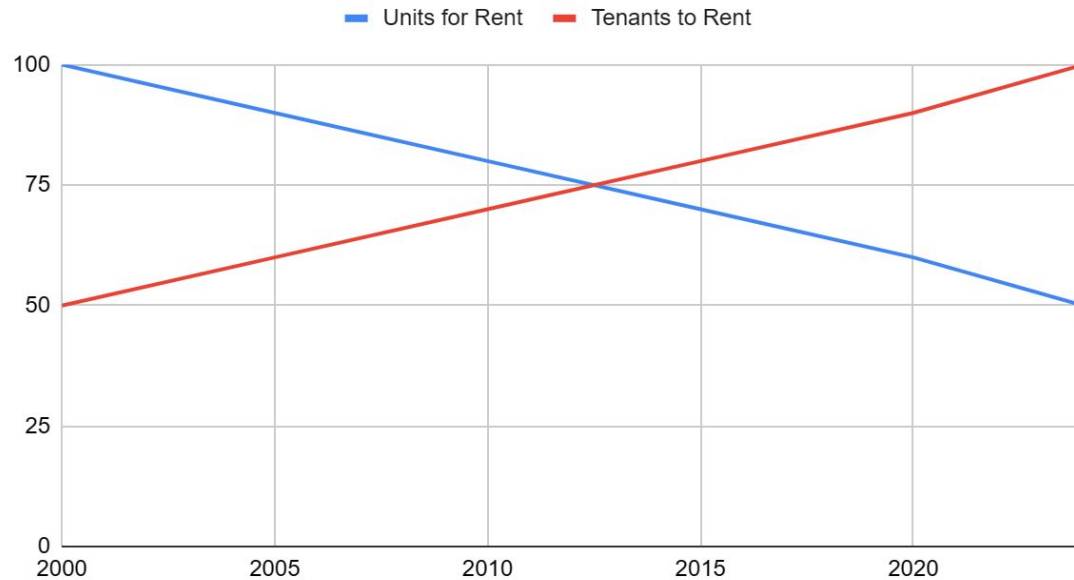

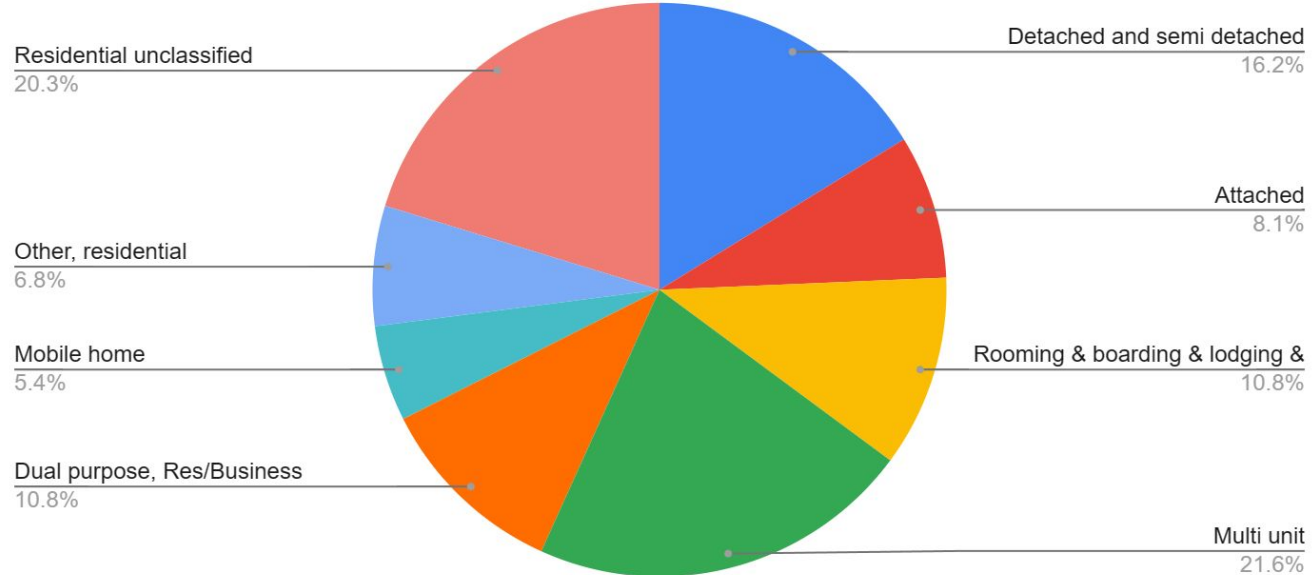

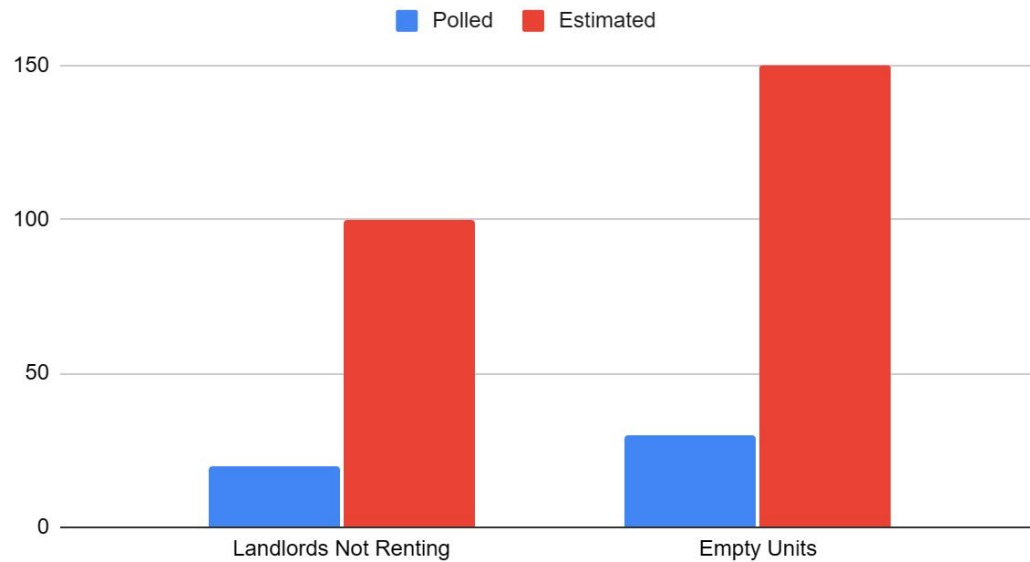
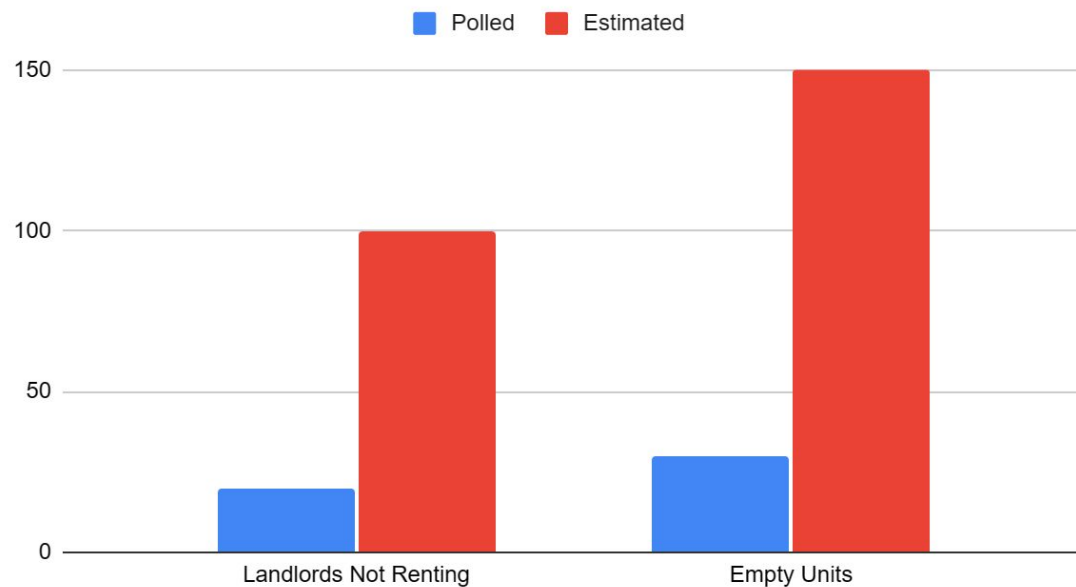

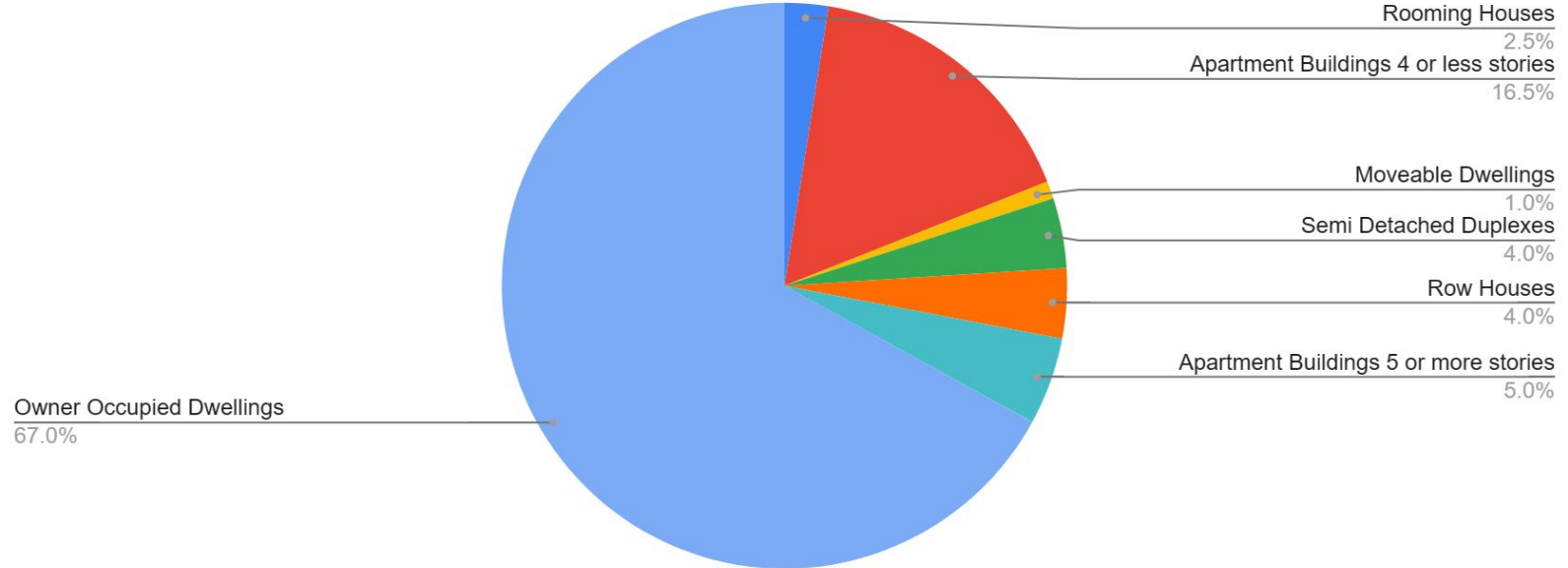

Thunder Bay living arrangements by structural types

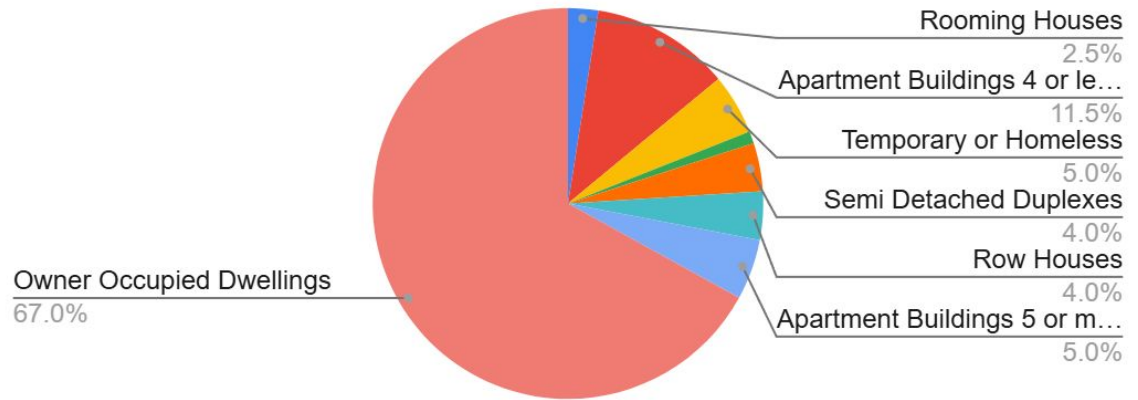
